## Salmon City !

There are only two places in the World where you can catch a Salmon within 500 metres of the CBD of a major metropolitan City; Vancouver, Canada and Dunedin, New Zealand.

Right now, Dunedin is the place to be. The recent Dunedin Harbour Salmon Competition held by the Salmon Anglers Assoc, proved this; with 43 Salmon being caught over the competition weekend. Tautuku Fishing Club member Sarah Hutton was the Winner with a 6.36kg Salmon and Roger Kan a trustee member of the Dunedin Community Salmon

Trust was a close second with a 6.31kg catch. In spite of being totally blind, Roger landed his fish, presented it at the weigh-in and gained permission to gut his fish. Roger proved that disability is not a reason to give up but is an inspiration in 'get out there & DO IT!

Weights were varied – 5 fish from 6.23kg to 6.36kg; 18 fish from 5.07 kg to 5.83kg; 19 from 3.30kg to 4.04kg & 1 @ 1.13kg. Wharf verse Boat ratio was 27 Salmon caught off the Wharf & 16 off Boats. Three Junior Anglers showed some of the “Seniors” that experience doesn't always win the ....

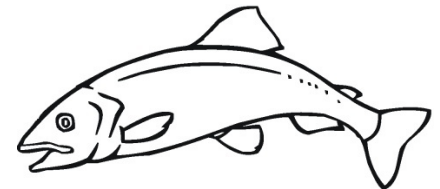

# salmon on ice



*The customary home methods of preserving salmon by bottling and smoking, alter the taste of the fish, but keeping it in solid ice, keeps it as good as if freshly caught and preserves the original flavour.*

## Method:

Take a 2 litre ice cream carton, place some thin slices of lemon on the bottom of the carton, then cut a steak of salmon about a centimetre less than the height of the carton. Place this on the lemon and half full the carton with water before putting in the deep freeze. ( Half filling the container with water to begin with, ensures the fish does not float or get in contact with air ).

- After this water has frozen, fill the carton to the brim and return to the freezer to completely encase the salmon in ice and so exclude it from any contact with air.

Salmon preserved like this will certainly taste like it has been freshly caught for many months, even after a year tasting excellent. The 2 litre carton will cater for most fish. Only with a very large fish will a bigger carton be needed!

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**"The secret of its success, is that all air is excluded from the fish and so it is a good as vacuum packing, but easy to undertake at home."**





# Salmon Release from NZ Marine Studies Centre

On Wednesday 14th March 2012, the volunteer's of the Dunedin Community Salmon Trust, Hen's Jacks & Sprats Club, and 11 Port Chalmers school children released 150 Salmon from the University of Otago's Marine Science Aquarium in Portobello. These Salmon, weighing from 200 grams to 600 grams are another huge success of the Dunedin salmon fishery; where hundreds of volunteer hours go into the raising and management of the young fish.

These 150 Salmon donated by the Salmon Trust, were from salmon smolt raised at the Salmon Hatchery in Sawyers Bay last Year.

Salmon are born in fresh water rivers and streams where they spend the first 12 – 18 Months of their lives before swimming down to estuaries where they spend the next few Months as smolt (Adolescent Fish). The ability to move between fresh water and sea water is called Anadromy. The Salmon then

swim out to sea where they spend the next 3-4 years of their lives and grow into adults. When fully grown the Salmon return to the fresh water rivers and streams where they were born/released to breed. After breeding they die.

When released, these salmon return to our Dunedin Harbour , rivers and streams as the time here after release 'imprint' them with the local seawater signature so they think of this as home!

Dunedin was the centre of the 'Gold Rush' era, and now is experiencing a 'Salmon Rush', much to the delight of the Otago Community and visitors to the City.

Every Year, many salmon in the 12 – 14 pound range are caught in the Dunedin Harbour with a few up to and even over 30 lb being reported.

# First Timers Fishing

## the NZ Nationals

**Armed to the teeth with more gear than the wife knew I owned, my son Jarod (left) and I were off to compete in the 2012 New Zealand Fishing Nationals.**

**M**y good mate and work colleague Cliff Halford (Alfie) had been on to me for years to join the club and to do the Nationals, so the time had come. Jarod my 18 year old son and I were primarily going for saltwater fly action. Tuna on the fly is awesome and the Kahawai this year were averaging a good size so thoughts of NZ records were on the mind.

Arriving Saturday afternoon we hit the water. Weather was good. We got some lures in the water and headed to my "Hot spot" for albies. We spent the arvo trying setups and options for raising fish to target on the fly. We landed a few, but no luck with the fly. Day two, weather great. For the coast anything other than solid rain and howling southerlies is great. Bit more energy today. A night of discussing tactics had us amped and ready. It wasn't long before we found some fish. At this stage we were still focused on the fly with the focus on getting Jarod hooked up. As there were no workups we were limited to throwing the fly when hooked up on the spin gear hoping to latch on to fish following up their hooked mates.

The water was an outstanding purple blue, game fish colour.

After landing a fish it was decided to drift for a bit and let Jarod cast away. Next thing his new Hatch reel started peeling line and amidst the yelling were a mix of excitement and calming advice. After a short battle this was another "one that got away" yarn.

At the one hour mark we managed to get the albie in the net. This was a good fish! With no time to waste I joined Jarod by getting my new 5 weight out to have a crack at one of the



smaller blues. Jarod screamed like an excited school girl, he had hooked up. 6 foot of toothy critter wasn't happy. Then I was on. Kaos! Mine was in quickly but foul hooked so back he went...Jarod, well he now had two stories about the one that got away. Still got some nice footage of the shark taking the fly. Who said men cant multi task!

The west coast then kicked our #\$\$ as the weather went nasty for the next couple of days. But hey, that's the coast. With the bay blown out we couldn't even chase Kahawai.

We did get out for a while on the Wednesday and added to the tally,

**'Melanoma March'**– “March your Dad to the mirror”. Okay guys - with most kiwi men being keen on the outdoors, you need to think about your skin, look for freckles and moles and get them checked out! Early detection is crucial and with the number of people who lose their lives to Melanoma each year peaking higher than the road toll, it goes to show a lot of people aren't taking good enough care of their skin.

Here are a few key messages:

- Melanoma March is the Melanoma Foundation's key campaign and is focused on promoting routine and regular early detection.
- March is the end of summer and a good reminder to regularly check your skin.
- Routine and regular self-checking is the vital step to detecting melanoma.
- It's also important to check your families and friend's skin, especially your dad, husband, brother or uncle's because men are the most at risk.
- Kiwi men are more likely than women to get melanoma and less likely to survive once diagnosed.
- If melanoma is detected early and it's thin, it can easily be treated with surgery.

## **Background facts**

- Melanoma is the most serious kind of skin cancer and New Zealand has the highest rate in the world.
- Around 300 people die of melanoma each year in New Zealand. **In comparison, 2011's road toll was 284.**
- You're more at risk if you're over 50. 70 per cent of melanoma cases occur in people over 50 years old, especially men.
- Melanoma is also the most common cancer in males aged 25-44 years.
- This can all change if we check our skins regularly and see a doctor if we notice a change.

**Mercury Bay catch tuna**- Following a couple of great weeks at Whitianga some bigger tuna turned up to play. During the Nationals a 106.9 kg Bigeye was weighed. Not to be outdone, on the 26th Feb an 80 kg Bigeye was also weighed and a very respectable 170 kg striped marlin hit the scales on the 28th February.

**Te Kaha Rules** - Local small boat big fish exponent “Peacemaker” lived up to its reputation on 28th Feb when they brought to the scales a respectable 325 kg blue marlin. This club also fished well in the recent Nationals.

**Toots One Base results**- This competition is said to be the oldest One Base competition still running in this country. 55 boats battled it out over three of the four days earlier this month. The results saw local vessel GPS with overall points with three tagged marlin. There was a total of 14 marlin tagged and released, 8 weighed with 600 grams between 1st and 2nd and taking out the heaviest fish of the contest was Josh Carmody fishing on “Much More” with a lovely 129.2 kg Striped Marlin and winning the Tutukaka Hotel Trophy for the most points for a single fish and the Maui Trophy for the heaviest fish.

**Whangaroa One Base**- As much as the contest was blue marlin, blue marlin, blue marlin last year, it was all striped marlin this year with 63 either weighed or tagged and released, making for a contest full of action. The shark species were also making an appearance with 7 blue shark and 12 mako tagged and released. The weather could not have been better with hardly any wind and calm sea conditions and with the fish action from around 120 to 170m from the Cavallis and northwards, especially off Doubtless Bay and Cape Karikari.

**Tauranga reports**– Local launch Ocean Monarch who just happens to be leading in their in-house championship ladder weighed in a very nice blue marlin of 274 kg down Waihou Bay way, then tagged a stripey on 25-02-2012. Points leaders: Angler Points - Adam Milnes 1,941.62 and Vessel Most Points - Ocean Monarch 4,108.38.

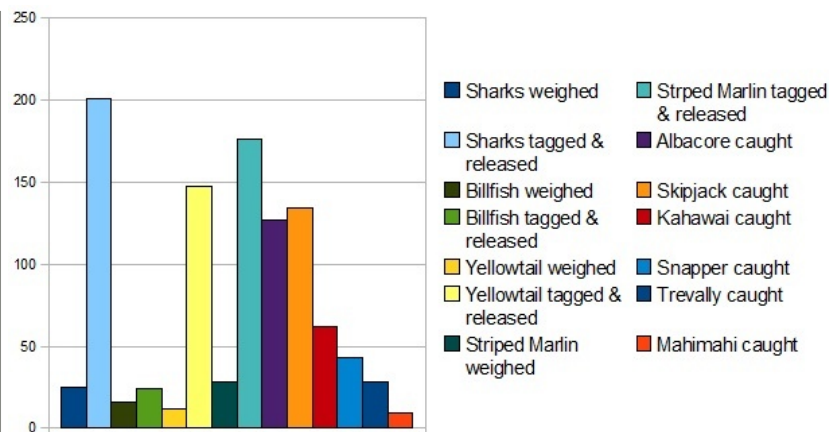

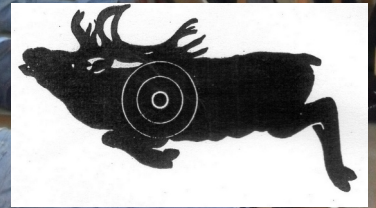
